# Holiday Memories 2013

It was a very busy Holiday Season at the Sheboygan County Historical Museum in many ways. We were open 32 days, seven days a week and saw 4,242 visitors come through our doors. There was something for everyone; toys, music, sweets and the Prange animation, to put people in the holiday spirit.

Ken Blindauer made over 900 sail boat kits for children to put together and the Garton Toys, always a big hit with the younger set, were again available for them to ride. These are a big attraction for the little people and they often stop at the Museum throughout the year inquiring if they can ride the pedal cars.

Our Music Elf, Judy Straus, contacted many of the area's musicians to play for our guests and, when there weren't performers, many adults and children sat down at the player piano to try their hand at playing Christmas carols with Jane Abromaitas.

The traditional cookies, bars and punch were provided by many of the Museum's members and the Prange animation was set in all new settings. This year Bernie Markevitch, took on the role of lead elf and, with the help of the Lake Shore and the Ivy



League Garden Clubs and many museum volunteers, decorated the Museum and the Taylor House using the theme, *The Gifts of Christmas*. It was centered around the large "candy holidays" of the year. The Prange animation, always a favorite with young and old, began with Valentines Day and worked its way through the year to Christmas.

While this event was going on, the Museum was acquiring and relocating Santaland from the Boston Store in Sheboygan.

# 2014 Seasonal Exhibit Underway

Despite what the weather indicates, spring is on the way, which means plans for the seasonal exhibit are moving into high gear. 2014 marks the twentieth anniversary of the Sheboygan County Veteran's Memorial just to the north of the Museum. In addition to several collaborative programming efforts, the main building will feature a related temporary exhibit featuring the many ways residents of Sheboygan County have served the nation, both on and off the battlefield.

As we move into the design phase of the exhibit, a major step in developing an exhibit is identifying materials in the collection to tell this important history. While there are already many objects to choose from at the Museum, there are several areas where we are hoping to find new donation or loans. In particular, we could use more objects made by local industries to supply and/or support the military, uniforms, memorabilia and/or recollections post-World War II and uniforms, memorabilia and/or recollections related to women in the military or auxiliary units throughout history.

If you might have materials we are looking for, or if you know someone who does, we would love to talk with you. It is best if you contact the Museum prior to dropping by to ensure a staff member will be available to talk with you regarding the items.


